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## Producers of Health

It's about the trails. Studies have shown that trails, pathways and open space provide economic benefit to a community through increased business development, increased real estate values, and increased tourism. Now consider the data showing the economic benefit to health.

At the end of June, I attended the Wasatch Choice 2050 Consortium and Active Transportation & Health Summit in Salt Lake City. The event was attended by community and business leaders, elected officials, planners, economists, developers, architects, engineers, academics, and many others. The underlying theme of the presentation by the keynote speaker was the economics of health. It was a message that struck a chord with me, and so I want to share it with you.

Tyler Norris, Vice President of Total Health Partnerships at Kaiser Permanente, gave his presentation titled, "Improving Health Through Community Development and Design". His bio and links to his speech and presentation can be found at <http://wasatchchoice2040.com/consortium/itemlist?start=14>.

Mr. Norris started his presentation by looking at the audience and saying, "If there is any one punchline I'd like you to take away from this, it's that you are the 'Producers of Health'". He went on to explain that those that plan, design, advocate for and implement livable communities *produce health*.

Norris defined health care providers as "sick-care delivery systems" that include insurers and the deliverers of sick care. Kaiser Permanente (KP) and IHC are integrated health care delivery businesses. Their organizations include both health insurance and health care delivery. These health care providers "produce" a sick-care delivery system that takes risk by collecting insurance premiums and then manages the cost of providing care to its members. Norris summarized a new health care economic model by saying that the health care providers will be *buying* the health that is *produced* by the community.

Some stats...

- Kaiser Permanente has 10.5M members across 9 States
- 1% of the KP members drive 5% of the cost
- 5% of the KP members drive 50% of the cost
- 18% of the United States GDP (\$3T) is spent on health care services. Norris commented that it is a level that is unsustainable. It also creates a trade penalty of as much as 12% with some countries.
- 80% of the annual health care spend is related to chronic disease. The top four are cardiovascular disease, diabetes, some cancers and chronic respiratory disease.
- Two of the four risk factors for these chronic diseases are inactivity and unhealthy diet (obesity).
- Two-thirds of Utahans are overweight or obese.
- Health care delivery costs are shared by everyone through insurance premiums and taxes (51% of medical is Medicare, Medicaid and military).

The biggest driver of the population's health is personal behavior at 40%. Personal behavior is closely related to the component of environmental and social factors, which is at 20%. Norris noted that by combining those two elements, 60% of the solution to improved health status is controllable. Norris said, "health care does not produce health" because it contributes only 10% toward one's health status. (Family history and genetics make up the remaining 30%.)

"But, it's impossible to eat healthy and be more active if it's not in the community."

So, it is about the trails. What if we could produce positive health outcomes by creating a community that has active transportation facilities, easy access to outdoor recreation facilities, which create the human/community connection through the convergence of public spaces? Whoa. Wait. Doesn't that sound a lot like the direction Weber County is headed?

Serendipitously, Weber Pathways, through the help of its generous donors, has made a significant contribution to the development of this livable community since 1995. The miles of pathways and trails are some of our visible results. Here is some of the behind-the-scenes work the staff is doing with your donation dollars to continue our effort to develop our livable community.

- As a member of the Chamber of Commerce Transportation Committee, WP is co-chair of an initiative to develop a quality transportation system that includes the integration of walkable streets, bike lanes and paths.
- WP participates in the Active Transportation committees of both the WFRC and Weber County.
- WP works with Bike Utah to support its mission to make Utah a better place to ride and supports its youth bicycle education program.
- WP teams with the Health Department to produce "Easy Hikes" brochures in both English and Spanish.
- WP teams with the Health Department to install wayfinding signs that include distance and time information to help trail users achieve their health-related goals. (Producing health)

To wrap up, the work Weber Pathways is doing supports the lower-cost, prevention component of health. We like now knowing we are on the producer side of the new health care economic equation. Wouldn't you rather spend more money on trails if the result is that you will spend less money on health?

## Pineview Loop Pathway Construction Progresses

Success! After almost 10 years of work, the PLP (Pineview Loop Pathway) will connect Eden to Huntsville. This five miles of paved trail will allow cyclists, walkers and equestrians to traverse along the reservoir without the risk of walking on the road.

This last section of approximately 0.75 mile, was particularly difficult to design. We looked at many different options. A raised pathway near the road using large retaining walls of steel sheets was explored, as well as a raised boardwalk along the shore; but both turned out to be exceedingly expensive, especially the cost to make it usable by equestrians. Cutting a pathway into the existing shore was also considered, but turned out to be unfeasible because of the steepness of the embankment.

In 2015 we found a design with help from the Forest Service, Bureau of Reclamation, and Pineview Water that was affordable and met our design constraints. The plan is to have the pathway continue from where it now ends, and then descend down to the edge of the shoreline. This design will require raising the shoreline base to around four feet and extending it to over 1000 feet. Mostly onsite beach materials will be used in constructing the elevated pathway and a rock wall will be used to protect the pathways during the event of high water. This design will also help to strengthen the beach from further erosion, giving beach users a safer way to access the Pelican Beach area.

Trail construction has begun and hopefully be completed before winter, the asphalt will be applied next spring. Thanks to everyone who donated to Pathways to make this trail happen, and I hope to see you enjoying the trail.



## Trail Modernization Project A Hit

In our last newsletter we previewed an upcoming project we call Trail Modernization. Much of our historic trail system was built without the benefit of modern trail design technique, and additionally has seen significant wear over the years. Many of the trails, particularly those heavily used trails on the front side of the mountains, have become "cupped", which creates a path for water to speed up the erosion process.

During the spring and summer months of this year several groups of experienced trail builders tackled problematic sections of existing trail, rebuilding and reworking the tread. The new work included rock retaining walls, armored trail in persistently wet areas and lots and lots of new water management features.



We would like to offer our thanks to Mark Miller from Wasatch Civil Engineering for spearheading this effort, to crews from Osprey Packs, Snowbasin, the HUMR running group, the Wasatch 100 racers, the Ogden Cycling education Foundation and everyone else who put in the hard work that has made this project so successful. This effort has created sustainable trails where before we were losing the battle with erosion and wear. We plan to carry this project forward into the coming years to continue improving the quality and sustainability of our legacy of trails in Weber County.

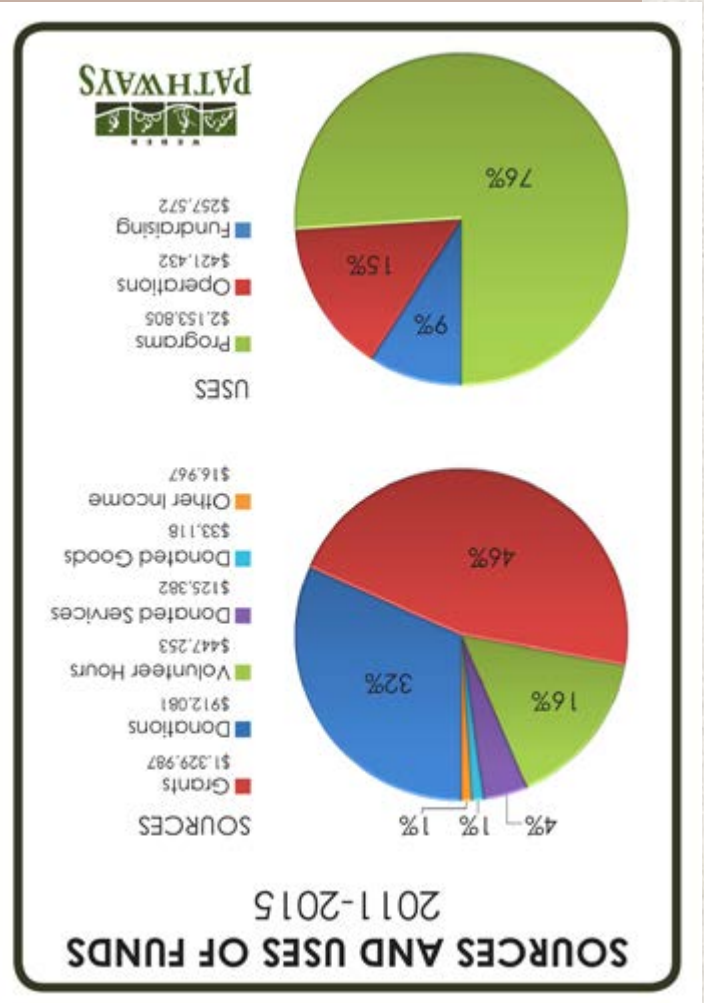
